GOSPEL Mark 1:1-8

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark

The beginning of the Good News about Jesus Christ, the Son of God. It is written in the book of the prophet Isaiah:

Look, I am going to send my messenger before you;

he will prepare your way.
A voice cries in the wilderness:
Prepare a way for the Lord,
make his paths straight,

and so it was that John the Baptist appeared in the wilderness, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. All Judaea and all the people of Jerusalem made their way to him, and as they were baptised by him in the river Jordan they confessed their sins. John wore a garment of camel-skin, and he lived on locusts and wild honey. In the course of his preaching he said, "Someone is following me, someone who is more powerful than I am, and I am not fit to kneel down and undo the strap of his sandals. I have baptised you with water, but he will baptise you with the Holy Spirit."

THE WORD

Relief of St John the Baptist in the Church of San Alessandro della Croce in Bergamo, Italy

Our Advent Gospel passage today presents us with the figure of John the Baptist. Mark casts him in the mould of the prophet Elijah, summoning his listeners to repent and return to the Lord their God.

He is preaching in the wilderness, a place associated in Jewish thought with that period during the Exodus when God and the people of Israel enjoyed a relationship of particularly close intimacy. However, the main emphasis in this extract is on John as the one who heralds the coming of the Messiah and calls on his hearers to prepare themselves for the coming of the one they are waiting for. The evangelist may be exaggerating when he says that *all* Judaea and *all* the people of Jerusalem answered his call, but John is shown elsewhere as enjoying widespread respect.

Mark presents Jesus as the fulfilment of the Jewish scriptures by quoting from the prophets Isaiah and Malachi in John's call to prepare a way for the Lord: John describes Jesus as the one who is more powerful than he is, which indicates that although later he baptises Jesus, he is not greater than Jesus. John's baptism is a symbol of the person's willingness to amend their life. The baptism of the one coming who is greater than John will be with the Holy Spirit: this Spirit represents the power of God at work to bring about holiness in the person, and so represents a deeper renewal than that of the Baptist. This is the beginning of the Good News.

LEARN

The Gospel according to Mark has no "infancy narrative": the evangelist introduces Jesus as an adult.

Mark presents John the Baptist in terms of the Old Testament prophet Elijah.

The Old Testament reading at Mass is connected with the reading from the Gospel and shows the connection between the Hebrew and Christian scriptures.

REFLECT

he Gospel of Mark opens with Jesus as an adult; there are no stories about the circumstances of his conception and birth. The evangelist confronts us immediately with the uncomfortable figure of John the Baptist and his call to rethink our way of life and our priorities, especially our relationship with our God. By presenting his understanding of Jesus as a story, Mark is inviting us to become part of the story, to involve ourselves in what is going on as we read or hear the various Gospel episodes. So today we can listen to John the Baptist's preaching not simply as something which happened a long time ago, but as something addressed to each one of us individually today.

The word metanoia, usually translated as "repentance", really means "to change one's way of thinking". In many ways, it is easy to adjust our behaviour, to correct faults and adopt positive practices. It takes more effort, and honesty, to examine our attitudes and beliefs and to change those. Advent is the time when we are invited to think, not so much about the baby Jesus, but rather about the coming of God the Lord into our lives and hearts here and now. We might think about our own baptism and what that means to us. If we use the next three weeks to look at what Jesus means to us and draw closer to him in friendship, it will be time well spent.

DO

Make the Sign of the Cross with holy water and think about your baptism: how could you deepen your relationship with God during Advent?

Arrangements for Christmas 2020

In normal times we would expect to see over three hundred people in our church at Christmas. As we all know, however, these are not normal times. The physical constraints of our building, Covid-protocols and other factors severely restrict the numbers we can accommodate to a maximum of about twenty! Much as we would all like to come together for a celebration of the great feast of Our Lord's incarnation with mass on Christmas Day itself, this will clearly not be possible. The Bishops' Conference, however, reminds us that the Feast of Christmas has an Octave, which means that the whole period from the Vigil on Christmas Eve to New Year's Day inclusive is one great Christmas Feast: every day in that period is, liturgically, Christmas Day. This opens up the possibility of a more significant number of people being able to attend a 'Christmas' mass over the Christmas period.

Church Opening over the Christmas Period:

Many may wish to make a short visit to the Church over the Christmas period and so, in addition to the arrangements for various masses (see below), the church will be open for individual visits as follows:

Christmas Eve: 3.00 – 4.00 p.m. for Children to visit the Crib Christmas Day: an extended opening from 10.30 a.m. – 12.00 p.m.

Other days: after mass until 11.00 a.m.

Arrangements for Mass over the Christmas Period:

In order to be as equitable, fair and as safe as possible, parishioners are invited to register an interest to be allocated one mass over this Christmas period (i.e. from the Vigil on Christmas Eve to New Year's Day inclusive) and to do so **by midnight on Tuesday, 15th December**. Places will then be randomly allocated, and parishioners will be advised shortly afterwards which mass they have been allocated. Apart from indicating you would not be available for the evening mass on Christmas Eve or that you are working mid-week, **you will not be able to choose any particular mass** though you may decline if the date you are given is not convenient. Once places have been allocated please notify us (even up to 5.00 p.m. the night before) if you or any of your group cannot attend for any reason, as your place(s) can then be offered to someone else. Applications may only be made in respect of individuals or family/bubble groups. Due to the track and trace requirements, only the names confirmed will be admitted: no substitutions or swapping will be allowed. The random allocation of places will be 'front-loaded', i.e. starting with Christmas Eve and working forward from there. So, if sixty people sign up then they will all be allocated a mass over the Christmas weekend; if a hundred people sign up, then the allocation will be spread further across the week.

Parishioners attending mass <u>with confirmed reservations only</u> should queue outside the Church in a socially distanced manner. The door will be unlocked promptly ten minutes before mass and will be closed five minutes before mass starts <u>after which there will be no entry, so please be punctual</u>. Hands must be sanitised on entry and face masks must be worn at all times, except when receiving communion or for children under the age of eleven. Names & addresses will be kept for 21 days and if necessary, may be passed to *NHS Test & Trace*. The QR code is posted on the main notice board for those who have the NHS contact tracing App. Please do not attend if any of your group is unwell or has symptoms of COVID.

Please note: There will be no access to the hall, the lift or to the toilets.

Other local churches are also expected to have booking arrangements for mass at Christmas.
